A Letter from Home

April 18, 1865

Governor Andrew Gurtin;

Dear Sir.

St is with the greatest of pleasure that S have seated myself to draft a line to you to inform you that S was sent a letter from my husband who is at City Roint in the 88th Regiment, and S have received this letter back. He has yet to contact my family and we have never had any of his pay yet. S truly hope you will do something for me. S went to the Commissioners and they said they would not give me any of his pensions until S proved his disposition. S heard that you were willing to assist the wives and widows. For nights and days S have struggled to keep my children and my family together, but now S have took sick and under the doctor's hand. We could really use the bounty which has added up but S fear that disaster has fallen and S think he has been killed. Am S a widow now? So he, God forbid, a deserter? S am enclosing the letter that S received to assist you in finding his whereabouts. S want you to write me and let me know if he is alive. Be sure to write his status in a letter so that the Commissioners will believe me. S am full of anticipation.
